From Bob Doremus -- A look at Grapeview in the Early Years....

A Rebel Amongst Us



The settlement of Grapeview began with an unlikely individual, Lambert Bartlett Evans. A southerner, he was born in Florida's panhandle on May 2, 1836. With the outbreak of the Civil War he enlisted in the Confederate army, joining Florida's 4th infantry regiment in 1861. During the winter of 1862 his unit was encamped in Tennessee. While there he took on extra duty as a nurse, for which he was paid 25 cents a day, On June 17, 1864, he was captured by Union forces in Georgia and transferred

to a prison at Rock Island, Illinois. After serving about four months in prison he signed an oath of allegiance to the United States on October 14, 1864, and was released.

Seeking a new life, Lambert headed west. Little is known of his journey. When aasked, he would say, "I just started walkin' and walked till I saw the ocean". The Grapeview school report of 1923 has him first going to Colorado and then on to California. He was farming 40 acres of land in an area that would later become downtown Los Angeles. The Grapeview school report relates this amusing story:

"When by frugal industry, Mr. Evans had nearly acquired right of title to his land and his water right, he was literally driven out of his home by the dogs. That is, the dogs in such numbers chased through his gardens after rabbits as to destroy his growing crops, so in desperation he finally abandoned the place to the rabbits and dogs and came north to Puget Sound".

By most accounts Lambert Evans arrived in our region in 1872. He obtained a 16 ft. flat bottomed skiff and began searching for a place to call home. Stretch Island seemed to be an ideal location. Because he had fought for the Confederacy, he was not allowed to take advantage of the Homestead Act of 1862. Instead, he had to purchase 40 acres to begin his new life on Stretch Island.
